The route out of the Coronavirus crisis: latest guidance

As we carefully progress through Phase 3, it is essential that we continue to follow government guidelines to stay safe and minimise the risk of a second outbreak. This week we have seen several changes allowing for the reopening and restart of the following, in line with national guidance:

- Places of worship for communal prayer
- Opticians and dentistry for nonemergency patients
- Shopping centres, indoor bars and restaurants
- Hairdressers and barbers
- All holiday accommodation
- Museums, galleries, cinemas, monuments, libraries
- Childcare providers
- Outdoor face to face youth work and organised outdoor contact sports for children and young people

There has also been an easing of restrictions on attendance at funerals, marriage ceremonies and civil partnership registrations though still with physical distancing and limited numbers.

Don't forget, if you think you have symptoms of Coronavirus, no matter how mild, you should immediately self-isolate at home and book a test straight away. Visit www.nhsinform.scot for more information.
