
Staff News: Take 5

Your weekly coronavirus update



The First Minister this week announced a ban on indoor household visits for anyone in the Glasgow city, West Dunbartonshire and East Renfrewshire areas.

The restrictions came into effect at midnight on 1 September and are set to continue for two weeks with a review after the first week. During this period, no one in these areas should visit another household indoors – this includes travelling to homes in other areas.

We know this will impact many of our staff who live or have family or friends in these areas. You can find advice for staff living in local lockdown areas at www.renfrewshire.gov.uk/coronavirus-staff.

No matter where you are, it is vital that you stick to the FACTS: Face coverings | Avoid crowded spaces | Clean hands and surfaces regularly | Two metre physical distancing from others | Self-isolate and book a test if you develop symptoms.
