Renfrewshire Council's Gaelic Language Plan 2016-2021 sets out the Council's aims and ambitions for Gaelic over the next five years. The Plan will outline how we will seek to promote and support the Gaelic Language in recognising it as an official language of Scotland in the same respect as English.

We recognise the important contribution Gaelic has made on our history and culture and we will continue to support this, seeking to ensure our Plan supports its development in the area throughout its lifespan and beyond.

As a Council we facilitate transport for children who wish to enter Gaelic Medium Education, along with providing 3 weekly adult learning classes of which there is a high demand for places, and are delivered in the local community.

We understand the leading role that we have to play in the language's future and the Council is committed to increasing the number of Gaelic speakers and significantly enhancing the profile of Gaelic across the authority.

We have a small but vibrant Gaelic community in Renfrewshire and we are eager to engage with them to ensure our plan meets the needs of our residents. We are keen to safeguard the future of the language and culture, and recognise the place it has in our communities.

Finally we will seek to continuously improve and develop to ensure the sustainability of the language as a part of Renfrewshire's past, present and future.

Summary

Renfrewshire Council recognises that Gaelic is an integral part of Scotland's heritage, national identity and cultural life. Renfrewshire Council is committed to the objectives set out in the *National Plan for Gaelic* and has put in place the necessary structures and initiatives to ensure that Gaelic has a sustainable future in Renfrewshire.

Renfrewshire Council recognises that the position of Gaelic is extremely fragile and if Gaelic is to be revitalised as a living language in Scotland, a concerted effort on the part of the government, the public and private sectors, community organisations and individual speakers is required to:

- enhance the status of Gaelic;
- promote the acquisition and learning of Gaelic;
- encourage the increased use of Gaelic.

This document is Renfrewshire Council's Gaelic Language Plan prepared within the framework of the Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005. It sets out how we will use Gaelic in the operation of our functions, how we will enable the use of Gaelic when communicating with the public and key partners, and how we will promote and develop Gaelic.

Renfrewshire Council's Gaelic Language Plan has been prepared in accordance with statutory criteria set out in the 2005 Act, and having regard to the *National Plan for Gaelic* and the *Guidance on the Development of Gaelic Language Plans*.

Structure of the Gaelic Language Plan

The key components of our Gaelic Language Plan are:

Chapter 1 – Introduction

This chapter provides the background and context relating to the preparation of Gaelic Language Plans under the 2005 Act and the structure of Renfrewshire Council's main areas of operation. It also provides a summary of the demography of the Gaelic language.

Chapter 2 - Core Commitments

This chapter sets out how Renfrewshire Council will use, and enable the use of Gaelic in relation to our main business functions. It covers key areas of operation such as corporate identity, signage, communication with the public and the use of Gaelic on our website. This chapter sets out *the basic minimum level* of Gaelic language provision to which we are committed to providing in the lifetime of the Plan.

CHAPTER 1 - INTRODUCTION

Setting the Context for Developing Gaelic Language Plans

The Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005 and the issuing of a notice:

The Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005 was passed by the Scottish Parliament with a view to securing the status of the Gaelic language as an official language of Scotland commanding equal respect with the English language.

One of the key features of the 2005 Act is the provision enabling Bòrd na Gàidhlig to require public bodies to prepare Gaelic Language Plans. This provision was designed to ensure that the public sector in Scotland plays its part in creating a sustainable future for Gaelic by raising its status and profile and creating practical opportunities for its use.

Consultation on a draft Gaelic Plan:

The 2005 Act requires public bodies to bring the preparation of its Gaelic Language Plan to the attention of all interested parties. Renfrewshire Council has consulted publicly on the draft of its Gaelic Language Plan in July and August 2015 and has taken into account representations made to it during the consultation process.

Approval of Renfrewshire Council Gaelic Language Plan:

Renfrewshire Council's Gaelic Plan will be submitted to Bòrd na Gàidhlig for approval in early 2016.


Overview of the functions of Renfrewshire Council and the use of Gaelic within our area of operation

Background Information about the Public Authority

Renfrewshire Council is a medium sized local authority based in the west of Scotland serving a population of 173,900 (2011 Census). The main centres of population include Bishopton, Bridge of Weir, Elderslie, Erskine, Houston, Howwood, Inchinnan, Johnstone, Kilbarchan, Langbank, Linwood, Lochwinnoch, Paisley and Renfrew.

Renfrewshire is a historic county awash with notable landmarks and scenic attractions which mark the area as a key outlet of culture and heritage in the West of Scotland. Tourism is an important feature of the area with Clyde Muirshiel Regional Park, the Gleniffer Braes providing breathtaking scenery among nature and Paisley Abbey, Coats Observatory and Weavers Cottage among the numerous historic buildings which link the community with their heritage. Glasgow International Airport is also based in Renfrewshire and is the principal transatlantic and direct long haul entry airport into Scotland. Renfrewshire also provides one of the busiest transport infrastructures in Scotland through the M8 motorway; a key artery between the northwest and southwest of Scotland.

According to the Scotland 2011 census, Renfrewshire has a population of 173,900 people, which is up from 172,867 in 2001; an increase of 0.6%. According to the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation 14.7% of Renfrewshire's population is income deprived, the most deprived of which is Ferguslie Park, compared to the national level of 13.4%. The latest figures from End Child Poverty show 21% of children in Renfrewshire are estimated to be in poverty.



Renfrewshire Council

Renfrewshire Council is one of 32 local authorities established by The Local Government (Scotland) Act 1994. It is split into five main services including, the Chief Executive's, Community Resources, Development and Housing, Children's Services and Finance and Resources.

Renfrewshire Council has 40 councillors across 11 multi-member wards, with each ward containing either 3 or 4 elected members. Our current councillors were elected at the Scottish Local Government Elections held on 3rd May 2012. The Council consists of 22 Labour councillors, 15 Scottish National Party councillors, 1 Liberal Democrat councillor, 1 Conservative councillor and 1 Independent councillor; with the Scottish Labour Party gaining full control of the council. Renfrewshire Council carries out its functions by dividing the responsibility for the administration of services among a group of boards.

Gaelic within the Authority's area of operation

Renfrewshire Council has been an active supporter of the Gaelic language within the community, serving a diverse range of cultures in order to advance towards the Gaelic language being held in equal respect as English. The public authority area has a significant number of Gaelic speakers and learners, and the local authority is committed to providing a sustainable support and learning system in order to maintain the significant community within Renfrewshire.

According to the 2011 Census, the number of people with some combination of Gaelic skills i.e. understanding, speaking, reading and/or writing, has fallen from 1837 in 2001 to 1586. In fact all combinations have fallen since 2001, with "speaks, reads and writes Gaelic" and "speaks but does not read or write Gaelic" the only exceptions, rising by two and sixteen people respectively. Renfrewshire has a small Gaelic community but there are support and learning opportunities available across the area which will aim to redress this downturn.

Gaelic Medium Education 2013-14 in Renfrewshire

During the year 2013/14, 26 Renfrewshire pupils were receiving Gaelic Medium Education (GME). As there is no dedicated education facility based within Renfrewshire, pupils undertake Gaelic Medium Education at the Glasgow Gaelic School. GME follows the same "Curriculum for Excellence" as other Scottish schools, with the difference being that teaching is undertaken in the Gaelic language. Nursery (Sgoil Araich) children are introduced to the language and encouraged to use Gaelic as much as possible for communication. Gaelic is used for all learning and teaching in the first 2 years of primary school (Bunsgoil), with English being introduced for reading and writing from primary 3 onwards. In the secondary school (Àrd sgoil) Gaelic is used for the teaching and learning of as many subjects as possible.

Renfrewshire Council is currently in receipt of Scottish Government funding of £27,000 for Gaelic developments. This is currently used for:

- Transport costs for pupils attending GME units in neighbouring authorities.
- Renfrewshire Gaelic Language and Culture Development which is administered by Community Learning and Development who run 3 Gaelic classes: a beginner, an intermediate and an advanced.
- A Gaelic Development Officer with Inverclyde and East Renfrewshire. Both authorities make a contribution with Renfrewshire for the cost of this officer; who works 30 hours a week across the three areas.

Renfrewshire as an authority is firmly committed to maintaining Gaelic education for its residents and those who wish to undertake this in future. As stated in the Children's Services Plan, Renfrewshire has a one hundred percent success rate in placing children who wish to access Gaelic Medium Education into Gaelic schools.

Community Education

This commitment is further echoed in the provision of Gaelic language classes provided by Community Learning and Development. Classes take place across three days and learners are divided into three classes, of which there are currently 16 beginners, 10 in the intermediate class and 18 undertaking the advanced class. This is a total of 44 attendees with 36 names currently on the waiting list for a place in a class. This shows the prominence of the language within Renfrewshire and the continual need for consolidation and expansion. Through this Plan, Renfrewshire can set out the correct aims and objectives to ensure the desire for the language is met with adequate resources.

Gaelic within the local authority

Renfrewshire Council currently has 8143 employees which are located across a number of Council buildings. Employees come from a variety of authorities to work within the organisation which in turn offers a wide range of viewpoints.

An audit of the skills currently held by staff within Renfrewshire Council was undertaken and gathered 516 respondents. Staff were surveyed with a variety of questions in order to gauge the language skills which exist within the workforce and ascertain the capacity of council employees.

Of the respondents, 7 (1.36%) were currently learning Gaelic although only 5 of these felt confident enough to be able to translate.

233 (43.13%) employees indicated that they would be interested in Gaelic which is an encouraging statistic for the future of the language in Renfrewshire.

However, only 8.9 % of respondents were aware that there are 3 learners' classes available in the authority so promotion of these classes could be enhanced to ensure adults are aware of this opportunity.

6 (1.16%) of the respondents currently have a child in Gaelic Medium Education.

There were a variety of positive responses regarding the promotion of Gaelic and how it could be advanced with in Renfrewshire. These focused on increased use of Gaelic on signage, involving Gaelic in the school curriculum, both primary and secondary, and further promotion of the Gaelic Learners classes. The development of staff capacity has been incorporated into our Plan.

There are currently three Gaelic organisations operating within Renfrewshire.

- The SONAS Gaelic group is based in Paisley and provides Gaelic learning courses for adults. The group is of mixed ability, with both disabled and able bodied members and has been in operation since 2003. The group operates with a core membership of 20.
- Clann Gàidhlig was established in 2004 and has a membership in excess of 100, with members from across the three local authority areas of Renfrewshire, East Renfrewshire, Inverclyde. Their main objectives are to promote awareness of Gaelic language and culture, to provide a voice for all who have an interest in the language and to offer opportunities for them to meet socially and develop their knowledge and understanding.
- The Paisley Highlanders also meet regularly to advance the culture and language via social events.

CHAPTER 2 - CORE COMMITMENTS

In its statutory *Guidance on the Development of Gaelic Language Plans*, Bòrd na Gàidhlig notes that creating the right environment for the use of Gaelic in public life is one of the key components of language regeneration. The Bòrd has identified four core areas of service delivery that it wishes public bodies to address when preparing Gaelic Language Plans:-

Identity: corporate identity

signage

Communications: reception

telephone

mail and e-mail

forms

public meetings

complaints procedures

Publications: public relations and media

printed material

websites exhibitions

Staffing: training

language learning

recruitment advertising

This section of the plan will detail the public body's core commitments in relation to the Bòrd's "Guidance on Development of Gaelic Language Plans".

Implementation of the Scottish Government's Strategic Objectives

The Scottish Government has, since 2007, aligned itself around five Strategic Objectives that underpin its core 'Purpose' and define the type of country in which we want to live – a Scotland that is Wealthier and Fairer, Smarter, Healthier, Safer and Stronger, and Greener.

The belief is that success lies in focusing all of government and public services on the achievement of this Purpose, and that by working together across all of these strategic objectives, we can increase sustainable economic growth so that all of Scotland can flourish.

In encouraging the preparation of Gaelic Language Plans, Bòrd na Gàidhlig is ensuring that the components of each plan are appropriately aligned, indicating how they contribute to the Scottish Government's Strategic Objectives.

This Plan adheres to the Scottish Government's Strategic Objectives and works towards ensuring these can be developed and achieved through successful partnership working.

Section 1 - Identity

Renfrewshire Council recognises the importance of extending the visibility of Gaelic and increasing its status.

Rationale

The presence of Gaelic in the corporate identity and signs of a public authority greatly enhances the visibility of the language, increases its status and makes an important statement about how Gaelic is valued and how it is given recognition. Developing the use of Gaelic through signage can also enrich the vocabulary of Gaelic users, raise public awareness of the language and contribute to its development.

Summary of current practice:

Renfrewshire Council does currently have an agreed policy for the use of Gaelic in its corporate identity.

Section 2 – Communications

Renfrewshire Council recognises the importance of creating opportunities for the practical use of Gaelic in a wide range of everyday situations and is committed to increasing its level of provision in this area.

Rationale

The use of Gaelic at the initial point of contact that members of the public have with a public authority increases the visible and audible presence of the language, and contributes to the sense that the use of Gaelic is possible and welcome. In addition to raising the profile of the language, it also creates opportunities for its practical use and encourages members of the public to use Gaelic in subsequent dealings with the public authority.

The use of Gaelic in interactions with the authority by mail, e-mail and by telephone is important in creating practical opportunities for the use of the language, and in contributing to the sense that its use is possible and welcome. The presence of Gaelic in a wide range of bilingual forms and Gaelic only forms can also greatly enhance the visibility and prestige of the language. The preparation of Gaelic versions of forms, applications and similar documents can also assist in expanding the range of Gaelic terminology and the awareness of the Gaelic-speaking public of such terminology, thus helping the development of the language itself.

Summary of current practice

- Renfrewshire Council recognises the importance of creating opportunities for the practical use of Gaelic in a wide range of everyday situations and is committed to increasing its level of provision in this area, and we support the development of these approaches in our communication strategies

Section 3 – Publications

Renfrewshire Council is committed to increasing the use of Gaelic in these areas where the subject matter is of most interest to the general public or relates specifically to Gaelic issues.

Rationale

The use of Gaelic in a range of printed material can assist Gaelic development in a variety of ways. It helps increase the visibility of the language, it enhances Gaelic's status by being used in high profile publications, and it can help develop new and enhance existing terminology. The use of Gaelic in the media helps demonstrate a public authority's commitment to making important information available through the medium of Gaelic, as well as enhancing the visibility and status of the language. As more people access information about public authorities through their websites, making provision for the use of Gaelic can significantly enhance the status and visibility of the language. It also promotes the use of new and existing technology.

Summary of current practice

- Renfrewshire Council is committed to increasing the use of Gaelic in the areas where the subject matter is of most interest to the general public or relates specifically to Gaelic issues.
- Renfrewshire Council does not currently issue press releases in Gaelic.
- Renfrewshire Council does not currently print material in Gaelic.
- Renfrewshire Council currently has no Gaelic content on its webpages and no reports relevant to Gaelic are published in the language.

Section 4 - Staffing

Renfrewshire Council recognises the importance of seeing Gaelic as an important job skill and of identifying situations in which its use is essential or desirable. Renfrewshire Council also recognises the importance of enabling staff to develop their Gaelic skills if they wish to do so.

Rationale

In order to deliver services through the medium of Gaelic, it is necessary to develop the appropriate job and language skills of staff. The provision of language learning for staff helps promote adult Gaelic learning and promotes Gaelic as a useful skill in the workplace. Identifying jobs where Gaelic is a designated skill will contribute greatly to the status of the language and identify it as a positive skill to acquire.

Advertising posts in Gaelic also recognises that Gaelic should be used in public life and that Gaelic users have an important role to play within a public authority. Authorities should adopt and apply objective criteria to ensure appointments are made in each case on a fair and consistent basis, and reflect the identified skills needs of the post.

The Council will regularly audit staff skills and identify areas for development.

Summary of current practice

- -Renfrewshire Council recognises the importance of seeing Gaelic as an important job skill and of identifying situations in which its use is essential or desirable. Renfrewshire Council also recognises the importance of enabling staff to develop their Gaelic skills if they wish to do so and depending on business needs.
- Renfrewshire Council does not currently provide staff training in Gaelic language skills.
- Renfrewshire Council provides support for community led Gaelic Language Education and employs Gaelic tutors in the Community Learning sector, as well as the joint resource of a Gaelic Development officer with Inverclyde and East Renfrewshire Councils.

Chapter 3 – POLICY IMPLICATIONS FOR GAELIC: implementation of the National Gaelic Language Plan

Policy implications for Gaelic

Renfrewshire Council recognises that the various priority areas identified in the National Plan for Gaelic will be primarily implemented through our Gaelic Language Plan but that opportunities will arise to promote and develop the language through existing policy measures. Renfrewshire Council will examine current policy commitments to identify areas where Gaelic can be pro-actively incorporated and the priorities of the National Gaelic Language Plan initiated through additional methods. We see this development as corresponding to the normalisation principle which aims to include Gaelic as an everyday part of life in Scotland.

In the formation, renewal and monitoring of policies, Renfrewshire Council will ensure that the impacts on Gaelic will be in line with the National Gaelic Language Plan.

Overview of the National Gaelic Language Plan

The National Gaelic Language Plan identifies four interlinking aspects of language development which need to be addressed, and within them sets out a number of priority action areas:

1. Language Acquisition

Increasing the number of Gaelic speakers by ensuring the language is transferred within families and by securing effective opportunities for learning Gaelic, through:

- increasing the use and transmission of Gaelic in the home
- increasing the number of children acquiring Gaelic in the school
- increasing the uptake and availability of Gaelic-medium education
- increasing the number of adult Gaelic learners progressing to fluency

2. Language Usage

Encouraging greater use of Gaelic, providing opportunities to use the language, and promoting access to Gaelic forms of expression, through:

increasing the use of Gaelic in communities

- increasing the use of Gaelic in tertiary education and places of work
- increasing the presence of Gaelic in the media
- increasing the promotion of Gaelic in the arts
- increasing the profile of Gaelic in the tourism, heritage and recreation sectors

3. Language Status

Increasing the visibility and audibility of Gaelic, enhancing its recognition and creating a positive image for Gaelic in Scottish public life, through:

- increasing the number of bodies preparing Gaelic Language Plans
- increasing the profile and prestige of Gaelic
- increasing the visibility and recognition of Gaelic

4. Language Corpus

Strengthening the relevance and consistency of Gaelic and promoting research into the language, through:

- increasing the relevance and consistency of the Gaelic language
- increasing the quality and accessibility of Gaelic translations
- increasing the availability of accurate research information

Renfrewshire's commitment to the objectives of the National Gaelic Language Plan

Renfrewshire Council is committed to ensuring that the National Plan is implemented, and in this section we set out how we will achieve that aim.

1. Language Acquisition

Rationale:

Renfrewshire Council recognises that a sustainable future for Gaelic requires more people to learn the language and that attention requires to be focused on the home, education and adult learning as the key means of achieving this. We will take the following steps to help create a supportive environment for growing the number of Gaelic speakers in Scotland.

• Gaelic in the Home – To achieve an increase in the numbers of Gaelic speakers requires support in the home; ideally from family members who are

Gaelic speakers themselves. However, most pupils in Renfrewshire do not have this support available and so we will engage with neighbouring local authorities as well as national and local Gaelic organisations to learn best practice and develop strategies in addressing this issue. The strategies will include:

- (i) Raising parental awareness of the importance of Gaelic usage in the home.
- (ii) Providing advice to parents on how they can support learning
- (iii) Providing language learning classes and encouraging parents to participate
- Gaelic in Education At present there is no Gaelic Medium service provision by the Council in Early Years, primary or secondary education. Current arrangements ensure that 26 Renfrewshire learners are transported to engage in GME at the Glasgow Gaelic School, and indeed we have now expanded our provision to include an agreement with Inverclyde Council. It is with this background position in mind that we are exploring a collaborative partnership approach with neighbouring local authorities. The aim of such an approach is to establish an agreement between neighbouring councils that would allow for the long term and protected provision of GME across Council boundaries, ensuring the centralised availability of GME in the West of Scotland region, and thus expanding the number of places available as a result of this collaboration.

Rationale:

Renfrewshire Council recognises the need to strengthen the robustness and consistency of the Gaelic language, particularly in supporting the development of technology and the availability of translation facilities. We will support research into the Gaelic origin of place names in Renfrewshire and the development of an authorised place-name list in the area. We will establish links with the national place

names partnership Ainmean-Aite na h-Alba (AAA) and Gaelic Orthographic Conventions.

CHAPTER 4 – IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING

Timetable

This Gaelic Language Plan will formally remain in force for a period of 5 years from this date or until a new plan has been put in place. In Chapter 2 – *Core Commitments* and Chapter 3 – *Policy Implications for Gaelic*, we have set out the individual target dates for when we expect to implement specific commitments.

Publicising the Plan

Renfrewshire Council's Gaelic Language Plan will be published bilingually on Renfrewshire Council's website. In addition, we shall:

- issue a press release announcing the plan;
- make copies of the plan available in our public offices and reception areas,
- make the plan known to employees via Renfrewshire Council's Intranet;
- distribute copies of the plan to Non-departmental Public Bodies and agencies, agents and contractors;
- distribute copies of the Plan to Gaelic organisations;
- distribute copies of the plan to other interested bodies; and
- make copies available on request.

Administrative Arrangements for Implementing the National Gaelic Language Plan

This plan is the policy of Renfrewshire Council and has been endorsed both by our senior management team and Council members.

Overall Responsibility:

The Chief Executive and elected members will be responsible ultimately for ensuring that the Council delivers on the commitments set out in this plan.

Individual Staff members:

All employees will be provided with information on the content of the plan via the council intranet and developments will be notified via internal email and departmental meetings.

Services delivered by third parties:

All third party organisations which deliver services on behalf of the Council will be advised of the commitments within the Gaelic Language Plan.

Informing other organisations of the Plan

Partner organisations will be advised of the Council's commitments within this Gaelic Language Plan through the Community Planning Partnership.

Resourcing the Plan

Renfrewshire Council will resource the activities outlined through the budgets of responsible services.

Monitoring the Implementation of the Plan

Progress towards the delivery of the plan will be reported to the Council elected members and Bòrd na Gàidhlig annually.
